# The SNAP Program

Surrey's Natural Areas Partnership (SNAP) is a unique program that brings together the Green Timbers Heritage Society, the Sunnyside Acres Heritage Society, the White Rock and Surrey Naturalists Society, and the City of Surrey's Parks Urban Forestry section. SNAP's goal is to restore, enhance, and promote the stewardship of our City's urban forest.

SNAP employs youth who are interested in pursuing careers in the environmental sector and provides them with meaningful work experience. Since 2001, SNAP has hired over 190 students, many of whom have gone on to related careers across the Lower Mainland and beyond.

SNAP's 16 summer staff work in three distinct teams: Habitat Restoration, Tree Care and Urban Forest Outreach. Together, the three teams help to enhance natural areas, care for City trees and educate the community about the urban forest.

## **Habitat Restoration**



The Habitat Restoration team helps to restore, maintain and enhance the ecological integrity and functioning of natural areas in Surrey.

This summer, the Habitat Restoration team worked in 37 different parks and natural areas across Surrey, removing 22 different species of invasive plants. In total, the team removed 137 m<sup>3</sup> of invasive plant material covering over 6087 m<sup>2</sup> of natural areas in Surrey.

In addition to invasive species removal, the team completed a variety of projects including the installation of several swallow boxes, shoreline cleanups at Mud Bay Park and Green Timbers Urban Forest Park, periodic yard waste and garbage removals, a native species planting at the Godwin Farm Biodiversity Preserve Park and beaver fence projects at Fraser Heights Park and Chantrell Creek Park.

Lastly, the team helped to host four youth volunteer events where SNAP collaborated with the Surrey Youth Stewardship Squad and the Surrey Youth Sustainability Network to remove invasive plants at Hazelnut Meadows Community Park.

## **Urban Forest Outreach**

The Urban Forest Outreach team raises awareness within the community of the benefits of urban forests, promotes the adoption of stewardship behaviour in relation to urban forests, and fosters a sense of community connection with Surrey's urban forest parks.

To achieve this, the team undertook a variety of tasks throughout the summer which enabled the team to interact with 6544 people. The team attended 23 local community events where they increased the awareness of Surrey's parks and promoted the SNAP program and partners. The team also maintained a presence in 14 Surrey parks through the activities of park hosting and roving. While park hosting and roving, the team facilitated nature themed activities, provided park information and educated park users about park etiquette. Lastly, the team canvassed 1308 homes within Surrey with the goal of educating people about invasive species and proper yard waste disposal.



## **Tree Care**



The Tree Care team undertakes a variety of maintenance and enhancement tasks on the network of City-owned trees, contributing to the longevity and vitality of our City's thriving urban forest.

This summer, the team inspected 2114 City street trees and provided base maintenance to 1645 of these trees. Base maintenance involves the removal of vegetation growing at the base of a tree, followed by the application of mulch.

Throughout the summer, the team also completed a variety of projects including watering the Green Timbers Park Gary Oaks and removing invasive plants such as ivy from City trees.

Additionally, the team hosted two Neighbourhood Tree Care Parties. At these events, volunteers worked together with their neighbours to help maintain City street trees.

## **SNAP in Green Timbers Urban Forest – 2019**

This report provides a brief summary of the achievements of each SNAP team throughout Surrey and within Green Timbers.

#### **Habitat Restoration Team**

The Habitat Restoration team helps to restore, maintain and enhance the ecological integrity and functioning of natural areas in Surrey.

This year, Habitat Restoration continued to be SNAP's largest team with eight youth split into two Habitat Restoration teams. Each team was made up of one Team leader, two Team Members and one Junior Team Member.

This summer, the Habitat Restoration team worked in 37 different parks and natural areas across Surrey, removing 22 species of invasive plants. In total, the team removed 137 m<sup>3</sup> of invasive plant material covering over 6087 m<sup>2</sup> of natural areas in Surrey.

Within **Green Timbers**, the two teams spent a total of 486 hours doing a variety of tasks including the removal of 11 invasive plant species, the installation of a fence and a swallow box, meadow maintenance, trail pruning, planting maintenance, and litter removal from the shoreline and trails. In total, the team removed 13  $\text{m}^3$  of invasive plant material from an area of nearly 1000  $\text{m}^2$ .

#### **Tree Care Team**

The Tree Care team undertakes a variety of maintenance and enhancement tasks on the network of City-owned trees, contributing to the longevity and vitality of our City's thriving urban forest. In 2019, the Tree Care team consisted of three post-secondary students with one Team Leader and two Team Members.

This summer, the team inspected 2114 City street trees and provided base maintenance to 1645 of these trees. The team also completed a variety of projects throughout Surrey such as hosting SNAP's first two Neighbourhood Tree Care Parties. At these events, volunteers worked together with their neighbours to help maintain City street trees.

Within **Green Timbers**, the Tree Care Team spent 75 hours carrying out various duties. The team watered and provided base maintenance to the Garry Oak trees originally planted by Wady Lehmann and later cared for by his daughter Susan. They also provided base

maintenance to the trees located in the Green Timbers Lake picnic area and to the trees surrounding the pond located next to the Surrey Nature Centre's historic arboretum.

### **Urban Forest Outreach Team**

The Urban Forest Outreach team raises awareness within the community of the benefits of urban forests, promotes the adoption of stewardship behaviour in relation to urban forests and fosters a sense of community connection with Surrey's urban forest parks.

This summer, the team consisted of five youth with one Team Leader and four Team Members. The team was able to interact with 6544 people by attending 23 local community events, roving and hosting in 14 Surrey parks and canvassing 1308 homes within Surrey.

Throughout the summer, the Urban Forest Outreach team maintained a strong presence in **Green Timbers Urban Forest**. The team spent a total of 206 hours hosting and roving within the park. During this time, the team engaged 910 people by providing park information, nature activities and education about park etiquette. The team also spent 42 staff hours helping to host the 31<sup>st</sup> anniversary of the dedication of Green Timbers Urban Forest Park.
